Trillium rivale is a western American plant from the Siskiyou and Klamath mountains of Oregon and Northern California. Normally it has pure white flowers. The selection 'Purple Heart' has massed maroon dots in the flower centre. I believe it was introduced into cultivation by the late Fred and Roberta Case. I remember Mike and Polly Stone grew it in their Fort Augustus garden and raised several good coloured seedlings from it. Plants are about 10 -12 cm tall with the flowers c 2 - 3 cm across. If you buy it, buy it in flower to ensure getting the true well marked plant.
